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You can get free credit reports from the 3 big credit reporting agencies at **AnnualCreditReport.com** (<https://www.annualcreditreport.com/index.action>) . The 3 biggest credit reporting agencies — Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion — have a centralized website, toll-free telephone number, and mailing address so you can order your free annual reports in one place. Do not contact the three credit bureaus individually. These are the only ways to order your free annual credit reports:
